Why not celebrate Literacy Week for the entire month of January by encouraging your child to READ! As parents, it's important to promote and


establish the value of lifelong literacy. Knowing where to start, however, can be a challenge. Studies show that it only takes 20 minutes per day to vastly improve a child's reading ability. In one year, a child who reads 20 minutes a day is exposed to 1.8 million words. For children who only read 5 minutes per day outside of school, the number of words they're exposed to drops to 282,000. Encourage and challenge your child to read outside the classroom for 20 minutes a day.
